STRUCTURE OF ARTICLE

- The article shall be divided into parts consisting of the Title (a capitalized concise title not more than 19 words of 14-point, bold)
- Name(s) of author(s) / contributor(s) should appear after the title of the paper asterisked and the details of the author(s) including (Names, Title / Qualifications, Institutional Affiliation, e-mail / Phone Numbers to be stated in the footnote)
- Abstract (not more 250 words, containing: brief introduction, statement of problem, methodology, summary of findings and conclusion/recommendation)
- Keywords (not more than 5)
- Introduction, Body of the full paper (divided into sections and subsections where necessary- 2.0, 2.1, or 3.0, 3.3) and Conclusion (not more than 10,000 words). E.g. 1.0 Introduction; 2.0 Perspectives on Nigerian Philosophy; 2.1 Perspectives on Western Philosophy; and 6.0 Conclusion/Recommendation. Each word of the headings should be capitalized.
- The paper should comply with the JICL UNILARS ABRIDGED REFERENCE GUIDE (Journal of International and Comparative Law University of Ilorin Law Reference Style) which is available on line and accessible through the editorial board.

ARTICLE FORMAT / FONT SIZE

- The article word format should be in MS Word, 12-point Times New Roman, 10-point for quotations, indented to the left and justified on the right. The paper should not exceed 15 pages with 1.5 line spacing and footnotes of 10-point.
- The pages of the article shall be numbered serially from page 1 to the end. Regarding the number of pages, the Editorial Board will place more emphasis on content and gladly accept papers that exceed the said number (and up to 20 pages) if they are found to be of relative importance.
